### Lemon Surprises

Once in a generation, there occurs a tragedy, around which malicious gossip does not fester. In our town, it was the Warburtons'. Jed Warburton had been city treasurer when several thousand dollars disappeared from the public funds. Warburton admitted his guilt without quibbling. A woman was involved—a bit of news that left us all with mouths agape. For us, Warburton's breach of faith with his wife could be explained in but one way: that the human male is fundamentally polygamous. I have never seen a lovelier woman than Mrs. Warburton, nor one who approached more closely the ideal wife and mother. Not that she was a woman who bristled with conscientious virtue. Every one who had the privilege of glimpsing her character, knew that Mrs. Warburton's kindnesses went unheralded. When misfortune overtook her family, Mary Warburton was a sophomore at Wellesley. The girl never heard a whisper of the incident, however, until the close of the college year. No hint of mental anguish or financial stress appeared in her mother's letters. A group of influential men, friends of the Warburtons, made up the deficit in the treasury, and Jed Warburton left town. Upon his wife fell the larger share of the burden—temporarily, at any rate—of supporting herself, and keeping her child in college. Within a few weeks, Mrs. Warburton began to offer cakes and pastries for sale. We rushed to her with ridiculous sums; but she would accept only a fair price for her wares. Even the modest valuation she set upon her products, however, yielded her considerable returns, for orders poured in. Thus, it was that he had begun recognizing Mrs. Warburton because

- 1-2 cup butter
  - 2-3 cup sugar
  - 1 egg
  - 1 teaspoon lemon extract
  - 1-2 cups S-B-Rena Flour
  - 1-2 cup milk
- Cream the fat, add the sugar, continue to cream until the sugar granules have dissolved, add the egg, the lemon extract, beat well, then blend, add flour alternately with the milk. Pour into well-greased muffin tins or paper baking cups. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) about 20 minutes. Top of each cake remains soft, taking care not to leave the crusts fill the cups with jam, etc. Reheat the top of the entire cake with jelly. Frosting:
- 2 tablespoons Self-Rising Flour
  - 1-2 cup sugar
  - 1 lemon
  - 1 egg yolk
  - 1 tablespoon butter
  - 1-4 cup water
- Add the flour to the sugar, add well-beaten yolk and all the ingredients; cook until thick. Bake before putting into the cake.
- Jelly Frosting:
- 1-2 cups sugar
  - 6 tablespoons water
  - 2 egg whites
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1-4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Put the sugar, water and cream egg whites in the top of a sauce boiler, and place over boiling water. Beat for 7 minutes, remove from the fire, add flavoring and cream of tartar, continue beating until a right consistency for spreading.
