Polk county is your home—is our home, lets make it a better home. The natural agricultural advantages of Polk county are so great that even eleven cent cotton causes no great concern. We face no crisis. We have no bankruptcies. Nobody is going broke. And yet we would all welcome a greater degree of prosperity. What can be done for a GREATER PROSPERITY?
Said J. W. Habernicht, "A successful creamery and a canning factory kept busy by supplies from farms would mean more to Polk County progress than anything else. The weekly cream check has proven a boon to many farmers in other sections. Northwest Arkansas farmers found tomatoes for canning more profitable than 18 cent cotton. How would the count be now? Big trees from little acorns grow, but big profit cream checks don't grow from poor land. It takes good land to grow vegetables for the cannery at a profit. A fertile soil means profitable crops for a prosperous people.

Vetch The Worker

How shall we get richer soils cheaply? County agents Artz and Sams and other authorities tell us that "the greatest lack of southern soils is nitrogen and organic matter or humus and peas beans clovers and vetch answers the question. There are many reasons why vetch is the best legume to sow now. It

grows in the winter while our lands are idle, it has large seeds and so can be planted deeply or shallow, and it thrives on sour soils. Successful farmers over the country say it does better under average conditions than any other soil building crop, that it will quickly double the cotton corn and other crops.

County Agents Help

The Polk County Bank and Trust Co., has financed the purchase of a large quantity of vetch and it can be had at the Columbus Merchantile Co. Basic slag is so good for starting vetch that a car has been bought and will be distributed at cost. It does not the inoculation but the lime and phosphate it contains is a great help. County agent Artz and Sams are ready to render every assistance. Walter Baily will demonstrate at the courthouse Saturday a simple practicable plan to inoculate for success on the poorest lands.

Plot of Beauty

Lets grow this life giving soil building, cheap feed producer, VETCH. When in bloom the riot of of beauty shelters millions and millions of tiny workers busy gathering fertilizer free from the air. They never strike. They work night and day. They ask only a home on your farm. The seed waits for you and asks only to get in touch with Polk County soil
