"Tests conducted with wheat on the Piedmont Station near Statesville for five years gave the following average results." says G. M. Garren, cereal agronomist for the North Carolina Experiment Station." Wheat seeded October 1, yielded 11.-2 bushels; October 15, yielder 14 bushels; November 1, yielded 15 bushels and seeded on December 1, yielded only 7.9 bushels."

Mr. Garren states therefore that November 1 is the best time for seeding wheat in that section but all seeding cannot be done in a single day so it is best to lean backward towards the October dates than to go forward towards the November dates.
