SHOOTING AND BOMB THROWING MARSHALS IN W. N. C.

The shooting affairs, several fist fights and a number of arrests are reported in a report from North Carolina as the result of the election on Tuesday. Walker Breedlove, Democratic judge of election in Jackson county, is in Brevard hospital suffering from five wounds as the result of an argument with Jim Bryson, a Republican of absentee ballots at a Jackson polling place. Bryson, said to have been slightly wounded himself in the affray, is being sought by the police as the man who fired the shots at Breedlove. The election judge will recover, hospital attaches state unless complications set in.

Following a meeting of representative citizens this morning a reward of \$500 was offered for the apprehension of the parties guilty of throwing a bomb in Brevard yesterday. The explosion occurred directly in front of Republican headquarters, and shattered windows on both sides of the street, practically demolishing a parked automobile. Mayor C. W. Whitmore is head of a committee which is investigating the bomb-throwing, and arrests are expected soon.

Samuel Owen, shot yesterday, it is alleged, when he sought to intervene in an election argument near a polling place in Gloucester township, Transylvania county will recover. He received wounds in the hand and leg, as a result, it is reported, of an attempt to wrest a pistol from the hands of Sylvanus Mettall, who has been arrested and held in jail at Brevard. Mr. Owen is one of the leading Republicans of the county, and a member of the state of deeds. The contest in Transylvania were unusually heated.

No one was injured in the blast at Brevard although a crowd was standing near the spot receiving election returns and several narrowly escaped.

CITY HAS NEW OFFICE FOR PAYING BILLS

The Town of Tryon offices are now located in the old town hall building, where the payment of all city bills will be made. Mr. Rippey is in charge of the new office, and all city bills can now be paid at this office. A large safe has been purchased where all of the important papers of the city will be kept. Presbyterians Celebrate Professor W. Shilleter and Mrs. A. L. Berry Give Sound Advice.

Miss. Loris W. Preston arranged a fine program of World Temperance Sunday October at the town theater where the Presbyterians are worshipping prior to holding service in their prospective church building. Professor Shilleter opened the program with "The Evil of Strong Drink" giving a splendid address under three heads—Body—Mind—Character. He spoke of indigestion, lessened capacity for work and other deleterious effects on the body. He referred to tests in Yale college on subjects to whom one and two table-spoonsful of liquor were respectively analyzed and by who answers were given to mathematical problems showing different ability in handling the same, due to differences in doses administered. The spirit of fight was cited as the first characteristic of one addicted to drink.

Master Warrenston Preston recited the Golden Text "At the Last it Biteth Like a Serpent and Stingeth Like an Adder." "Learning to be temperate" demonstrated by two Bible Text, by Miss Betty MacFarland, and Miss Mildred Fife. "Control of the Appetite" Junior topic, was most clearly and beautifully presented by Mrs. A. L. Berry, Bible class teacher. Text "Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? So run, that ye may obtain." She referred to the long race these little one would have to run and advised them to yield all to Christ, while they were little, now so that at the end they would receive the crown of life eternal.

Miss Inez Caldwell recited a little sketch on "Daniel who refused King Nebuchadnezzar's wine and took water instead, becoming much healthier and handsomer than those who drank liquor. Temperance echoes from God's word were recited by Miss Mary McFarland, Miss Bertha Williams and Master Walter Newman.

Effects of alcohol in the form of two testimonies were rendered by Miss Edith Preston and Master David Caldwell. "Yield Not to Temptation," and "Tough Not the Cup" were sung. The cutest little piece on the program was the "Best Drink" by Miss Lillian Thompson, which completed the program.
