Food To Be Thankful For - Here's a choice of menus for Thanksgiving dinner depending on the size of your family: first cup, then roast stuffed turkey, candied sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, braised fresh tomatoes, individual pumpkin tarts, with merigue on top, coffee with or after the meal. Grapefruit with candied cranberries in the center, baked stuffed chicken, rice, brussels sprouts or five-minute cabbage, grape jelly, cranberry ice, frosted cup cakes, cider. Have a fruit course first, if you prefer. You don't need both. Lettuce with Russian dressing is good.

Cheap cottonseed meal is causing dairy cattle owners over the United States to increase their grain feed and to buy this fine protein feed at the expense of North Carolina growers.

Rapid progress in the use of music as a means of discipline in corrective institutions, is reported by the Conn Music Center of Elkhart, Ind. Music is not only being used successfully as a tonic for diseased minds, but is also being found effective in safeguarding youth passing through adolescence. Wilhelm van de Wall, director of the Committee for the Study of Music in Institutions and a criminologist and sociologist who has spent a good portion of his life in experiments along this line, finds that musical work with the insane and mentally weak tends to make the inmates of such institutions forget their

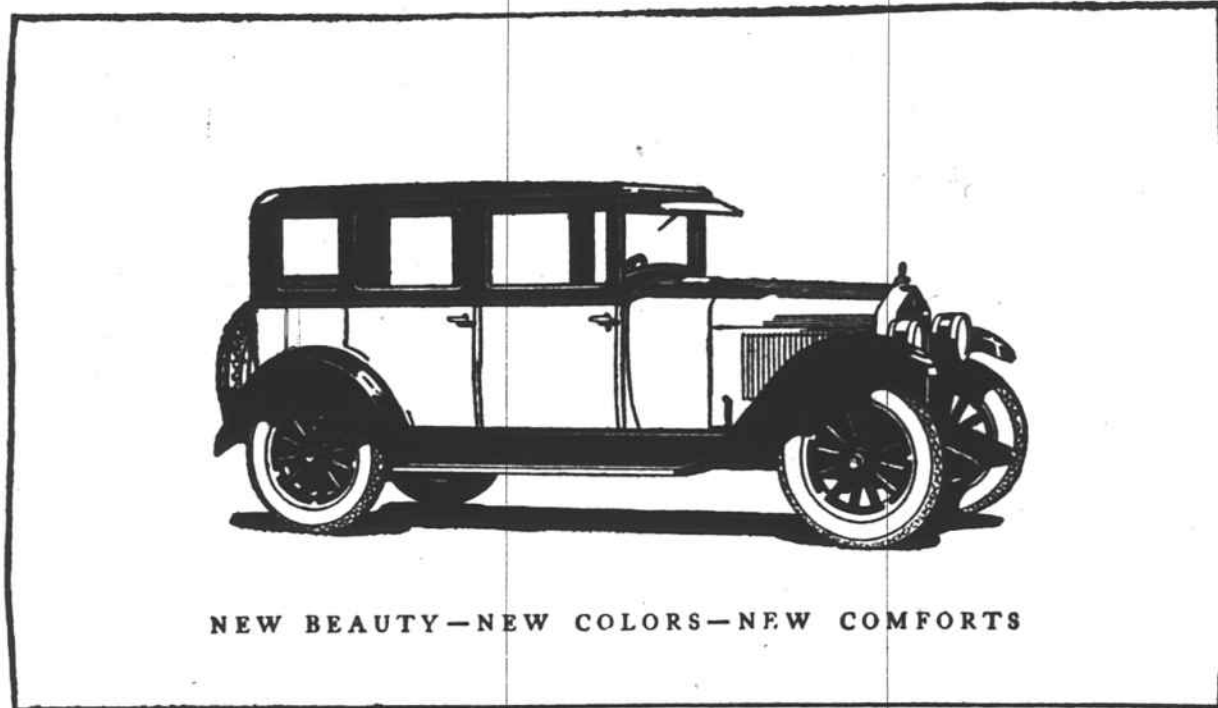
