MELBOURNE, Australia—(AP)—When Eamon De Valera, former Irish premier, visited here recently, he met the soldier who captured him 30 years ago. William Carruthers is now a Melbourne masseur, but was in the British Army when De Valera was an Irish rebel. "You've changed, Mr. De Valera, since that far away day when I arrested you in the name of the king," Carruthers said.

"I've been waiting 30 years to hear the true story of how you found me," De Valera said. Carruthers explained that this company searched house after house, acting on information that the trader was in a particular area. He said, "Dev wasn't the monster we had imagined. He came along without a murmur."
