

N. Carolina Far Below Average In Work Stoppages, Commissioner Says

RALEIGH — A comparison of data on strikes in North Carolina and the United States reveals that North Carolina had only 0.9 per cent of the nation's work stoppages last year, Forrest H. Shuford, State Commissioner of Labor, announced today.

This record in itself constitutes a tribute to the intelligence and patriotism of both workers and management in North Carolina," Shuford commented. "It shows that our people have been able to adjust their differences through cooperation and teamwork."

The Commissioner said that final tabulations received by him from the Bureau of Labor Statistics show that the United States last year had 3,693 industrial work stoppages, compared with a total of 35 in North Carolina. More than 2,170,000 American workers were involved in work stoppages last year, he said, but only 15,812 of these—or 0.7 per cent of the total—were North Carolinians. Idleness from work stoppages in the nation amounted to 34,600,000 man-days, of which 523,910 days—or .5 per cent of the total—represented time lost in North Carolina industry.

Looking at our labor relations record another way," Shuford continued, "we could divide the national total by 48 and get the average number of strikes, workers involved, and days lost for each state. On that basis, North Carolina would have had 77 strikes. We actually had less than half that many. On the same basis, we would have had 45,207 workers involved in strikes. We actually had about one-third that many workers involved. Likewise, we would have had 720,733 days of idle time resulting from work stoppages. Actually we lost far less time than that, in spite of the nationwide telephone strike which by itself accounted for about 20 per cent of the time lost in North Carolina."

Rhode Island Red Hen Keeps Pace With Inflation

Probably the only chicken matching her products with rising prices is a Rhode Island red hen owned by P. B. Beachem who lives east of Beaufort on the North River road. The hen has been laying eggs about 5 ounces average weight, 1 1/2 inches in girth and 8 3/8 inches in endwise circumference. The outsize products are due, Mr. Beachem believes, to his methods of feeding. The "inflation-matching" hen gets laying mash at 6 o'clock in the morning and corn at 6 in the evening. It's the mash, Mr. Beachem says, which is responsible for the large eggs. The Beachems have about 30 hens in their flock now, but intend to increase the number very shortly.
