Swiss Pigeon Flights Limited

BERN, Switzerland — (AP) — Carrier pigeons must not fly out of or into Switzerland without special permit of the military department, the Swiss federal council has decreed. The military department also was authorized to forbid the training of carrier pigeons within Switzerland if such training was contrary to the political or military interests of the country.
