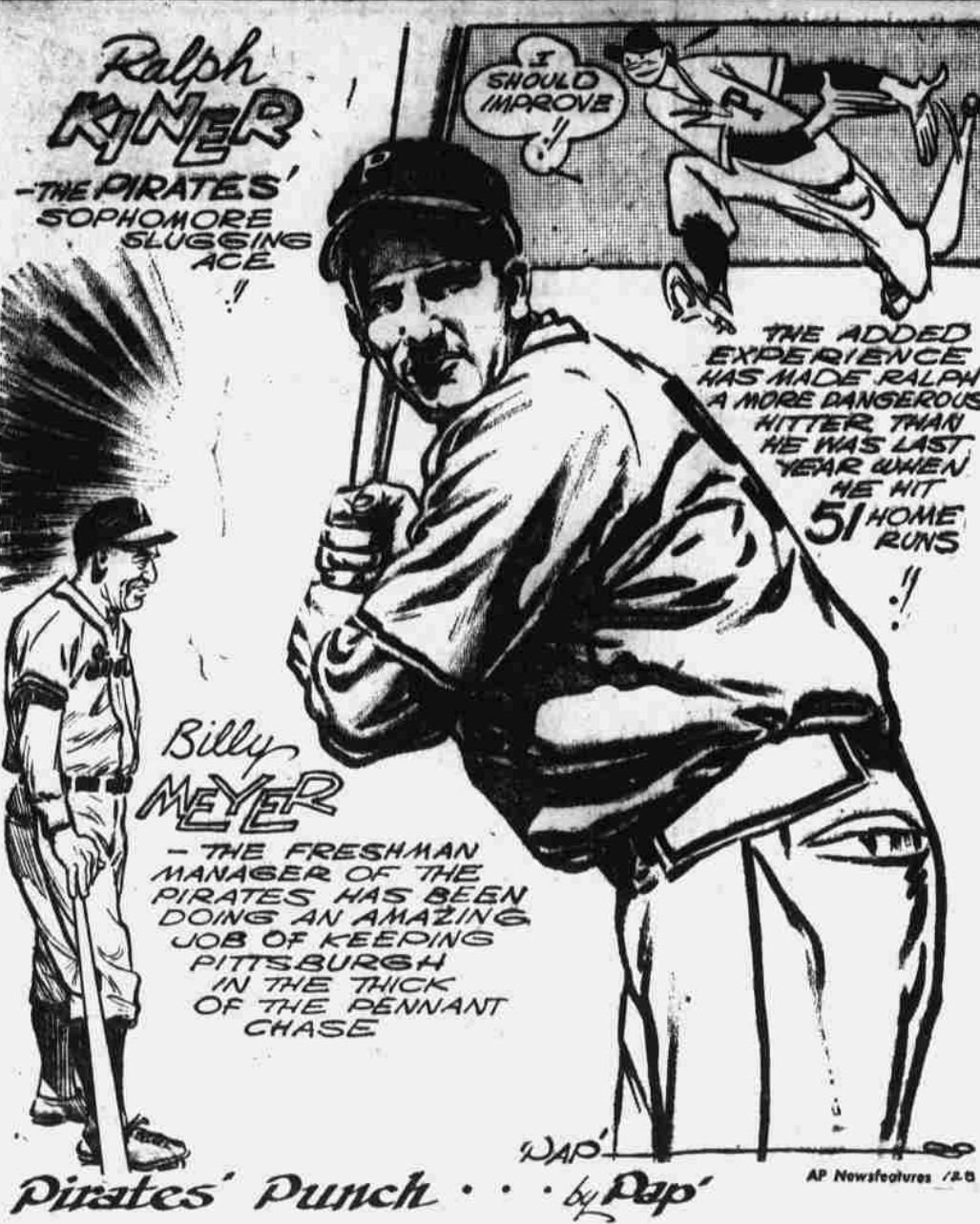

First Sailfish Still in Offing

First sailfish catch of the season in this coastal area is coming late this year. Some have been sighted by parties going to the Gulf Stream and some of the charter boat skippers say they have had the big fighting fish strike their lures and teasers, but so far none have been hooked, or brought aboard, which is the main thing when fishing.

On the other hand amberjack and dolphin have been plentiful this year in the blue water off Cape Lookout and also other sections of the coastal area. Some large catches have been made of both species and the record breaker, from size standpoint, a 60-pound amberjack was landed a few days ago by Capt. Bill Ballou. Capt. Alfred Pittman, skipper of the Lois Nancy reported catching a wahoo, another fighting tropical fish, a few days ago. Wahoo are seldom taken along the North Carolina coast.

Mann Tops Salt Water Batsmen

L. Mann, of the league-leading Mill Creek entry, tops the batters of the Salt Water League in figures released by the league this week. Mann, with .393, is batting five points better than his nearest competitor, Tom Dick of Wildwood, who is hitting at .388. In third place is J. Garner, of Mill Creek, with .382.

Leading the pitching department is C. Monroe, of Mill Creek, who has a perfect record of 3-and-0. J. Klontz, of Havelock, is also undefeated and is in second place with a 2-and-0 slate.
