Less Sand in Fertilizer

Assured By Grade Lists

RALEIGH. — There will be a whole lot less sand in fertilizers sold in North Carolina in the coming crop year.

This will be the result of removal from the fertilizer grade list of two old familiar but uneconomical formulas — 3-8-5 and 4-8-8. The former for many years was a popular grade with tobacco farmers and the latter was widely used for general crops, especially corn. They were cheap in price, but expensive in use, for 3-8-5 carried 520 pounds of sand to the ton and 4-8-8 had nearly 400 pounds.

The fertilizer industry itself joined with agronomists in recommending that these two grades no longer be registered for sale in North Carolina. To take the place of 4-8-8 they recommended 5-10-10, containing the same proportionate parts of essential ingredients in a higher ratio.

Accepting these recommendations, the State Board of Agriculture recently adopted a fertilizer grade list of 24 mixtures for 1948-49, as follows:

For tobacco only — 2-10-6, 3-9-6, 4-9-3, 5-5-20 (top-dresser).

For tobacco and general crops — 3-9-9, 4-12-8.

For general crops — 0-12-12, 0-10-20, 0-9-27, 0-14-7, 2-12-12, 3-9-12, 3-12-4, 4-10-6, 4-12-4, 5-10-5, 5-10-10, 6-6-12, 6-8-6, 7-7-7, 10-6-4, 14-0-14 (top-dresser), 10-0-30 (top-dresser).

Tucker Invades Auto Capitol

DETROIT — The rear-engine Tucker invaded the automobile capitol recently for the first showing of its production model scheduled to roll off lines in the Chicago automobile plant this summer.

Detroit newsmen, who have followed the Corporation's development since operations were moved to Chicago, were the first to see Tucker's new automatic transmission which company engineers claim is the greatest single advance in the field over the past 10 years.

Demonstrated in the private showing on the outskirts of Detroit were two complete cars and a chassis equipped with the new transmission, which combines characteristics of current torque converters and automatic transmissions to provide continuous, variable speed through use of fluid couplings and a controlled planetary gear train.

"This transmission represents an entirely new approach," said Warren Rice, engineer in charge of the transmission development program. "We have eliminated many of the complications inherent to the automatic transmissions, and achieved—in some ways surpassed—torque converter performance without the many precision parts that makes this type of transmission so costly to produce."

Rice said the dash control has only three positions—forward, neutral and reverse—and the design provides all the torque needed under all conditions without the additional "low" position added for emergency power in current automatic transmissions.

"Our unit has no heat exchanger, because we haven't encountered excessive heat," Rice said. "The highest temperature we have registered under the most severe conditions is 225 degrees F., and we can stand up to 350 degrees before we meet any difficulty."

To demonstrate efficiency of the unit, the chassis had both a speedometer and tachometer mounted on the instrument panel. In road tests the Tucker reached a road speed of 100 mph at 3000 rpm, compared with 5100 and 5300 rpm respectively for two other stock cars in comparable speed and horsepower ranges.

From idling speed, the Tucker engine was brought up and held to 1500 rpm, and the chassis reached 50 mph within less than 600 feet.

An exclusive feature that will be included in the production job, is an antireen brake which operates automatically to hold the output shaft in the transmission at idling speed. This mechanism operates on a separate hydraulic circuit.

"Cars with this transmission will 'push start' at 10 miles per hour," said Rice. "We tested other cars at the same time, under identical conditions and temperatures, and they required from 23 to 31 miles per hour to turn the engine over."

Automotive writers who rode in the cars and drove the chassis found essentially the same features that were promised when the Tucker was first announced, including the 166 horsepower opposed liquid-cooled six cylinder engine in the rear, hydraulic transmission of power from engine to wheels and a crash pad and safety compartment in the front passenger section.

"We found some changes necessary from original plans as our production model was developed chiefly in the interest of holding down production cost to compete in the medium price class," said E. Offutt, chief engineer.

"Our first series will have drum brakes. We had an efficient disc brake in the beginning, but we found it too costly to produce in a stock car. We are testing another design that looks promising from a production standpoint, and if it proves satisfactory and isn't too expensive to build we will put it in the next series."

The present model uses a single carburetor, but Offutt said fuel injection is planned later as optional equipment. The only noticeable change from the original design was incorporating a differential instead of using two torque converters.

"We built torque converters that worked, but found they needed further development to achieve acceptable efficiency and at the same time hold manufacturing cost within reasonable limits," Offutt said.

"We in the engineering department believe this automobile will out-perform any stock car built today, and it has important features that no other manufacturer offers in any price range."

"Our most important contribution, in our opinion, is increased safety, not only in design and construction of the body, but also in weight distribution for better handling and safer stopping in emergencies."

Speeding on waterfront — The harbor master of the port commission has the authority to make rules regulating speed of boats on the Morehead City waterfront rather than the mayor. At this point the question, "Who's the harbor master?" was raised but not answered.

Town docks — The town has no right to lease docks exclusively to one individual because docks are street ends and are available for use of the public.

Parking Ordinance — Parking is prohibited on the west side of 8th and 9th street between Bridges and Arendell between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. with the exception of Sunday when parking will be permitted on both sides of 9th street only between Bridges and Arendell. Parking is prohibited on the east side of 10th street between Bridges and Arendell.

Before the meeting adjourned commissioners decided that an officer should be placed at the Evans street and 28th street intersection Saturday afternoons and Sundays to alleviate traffic congestion resulting from visitors going to the beach.
