## Miss Carolyn Fulcher Becomes Bride of John Michael Moran

In a lovely candlelight ceremony Friday evening at eight o'clock, Miss Carolyn Fulcher became the bride of T/Sgt. John Michael Moran at St. Egbert's Catholic church. Father Elmer Landser officiated, using the double ring ceremony.

Seven-branched candelabra and white urns containing white gladioli were placed within the altar rail, which was draped with white and entwined with southern smilax. Floor baskets of white gladioli and seven-branched candelabra stood on either side of the altar.

Prior to the ceremony, Mrs. Claude Ricks, aunt of the bride, rendered a program of organ music, including "Because," and "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life." Mr. Kenneth Bradley of Charleston, W. Va., sang Grieg's "I Love Thee." Mrs. Josiah Bailey Jr. rendered Gounod's "Ave Maria," and Mr. Claude Ricks of Pantego, N. C., uncle of the bride, sang "I Love You Truly." The traditional wedding marches were used.

The bride entered on the arm of her father, W. L. Fulcher. Her wedding gown of white duchess satin, fashioned with a long-waisted, fitted bodice and sweetheart neckline, was buttoned down the back with tiny covered buttons.

The long sleeves ended in cilia points over the hands. The full skirt, fashioned with a bustle, extended into a sweeping circular train. Her finger-tip length veil of imported French illusion fell from a coronet of crystallized orange blossoms. Her only ornament was a diamond lavalier, an heirloom in her mother's family. She carried an arm bouquet of white bridal roses and Bristol fairy, tied with white satin ribbon.

Miss Ruth Macy, the maid of honor, wore a gown of pale blue summer taffeta, fashioned with a deep round neckline outlined by a wide bertha, and a very full skirt with circular hip yoke. Her short, pointed mitts were of matching material. She carried an arm bouquet of long-stemmed American Beauty roses and Bristol fairy, and wore a bandeau of matching flowers and blue tulle in her hair. The bride chose Mrs. Kenneth Bradley of Charleston, W. Va., as her matron of honor, and Misses Patsy Ballou and Wilma Wade as bridesmaids. Their gowns and bouquets were identical to those of the maid of honor.

S/Sgt. Henry S. Moran of Fayetteville was his brother's best man. Groomsmen were T/Sgt. A. F. Tomlinson, Sgt. J. M. McBrayne, and S/Sgt. J. L. Gonzalez, all of Cherry Point.

Mrs. Fulcher, mother of the bride, chose a becoming floor-length gown of dusty rose crepe with a corsage of pink roses.

The bride is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Fulcher. She is a graduate of the Morehead City High school and completed the commercial course at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. At the time of her marriage, she was society editor of the NEWS-TIMES.

Mr. Moran is the son of Mrs. Patrick Moran and the late Mr. Moran of Westernport, Md. He is a graduate of Bruce High school in Westernport. For the past six years, he has served in the United States Marine Corps, serving two years overseas during World War II. At present he is stationed at Cherry Point.

Immediately following the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Moran were honored at a reception at the home of the bride's parents on North Sixth street.

Mrs. James McCluer, aunt of the bride, greeted the guests, and Mrs. Louise Norris presented them to the receiving line. Guests were directed by Mrs. Rhonda Ricks, aunt of the bride, to the gift room, where Mrs. W. H. Windley, also an aunt of the bride, presided. The bride's book was presided over by Miss Nellie Fulcher, aunt of the bride.

The dining room table, covered with an imported lace cloth, was centered with a four-tiered wedding cake, topped by a miniature bride and groom. Over the table was hung a large white wedding bell, from which streamers of white satin ribbon reached to the corners of the room. On the table were arrangements of white gladioli and lily fern, and triple-branched candelabra. The crystal punch bowl was placed on another table.

Following the cutting of the first slice by the bridal couple, Mrs. Healden Ballou served the wedding cake. Mrs. I. E. Pittman served the punch, and Mrs. Roma Styron assisted in the serving of the other refreshments, nuts and mints.

For traveling Mrs. Moran chose a white cord summer suit, with which she wore brown accessories, and the corsage of white roses lifted from her wedding bouquet.

After a short wedding trip, Mr. and Mrs. Moran will be at home in Morehead City.

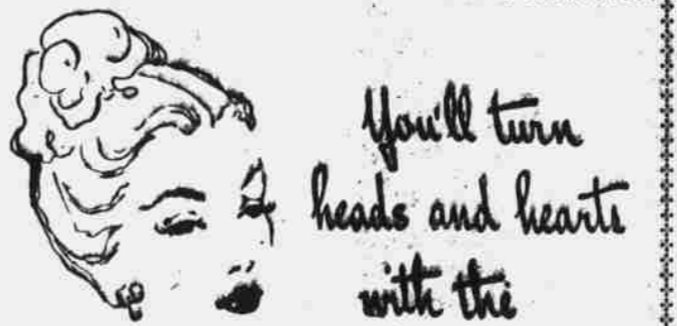
Miss Wilma Wade returned to Durham Sunday after spending a week here with her family.
