Capt. Henry Davis Goodwin, 76, died in the Morehead City hospital at 7:30 Saturday night. He had been taken to the hospital at about 7:15 p.m. after suffering a heart attack.

Captain Goodwin, who retired from the U. S. Coast Guard in 1931, was for many years in charge

of the Fort Macon Coast Guard sta- tion. Since his retirement, he had been very prominent in the activi- ties of the Methodist church. He was a member of the board of stewards, chairman of the board of trustees, and treasurer of the First Methodist Church school.

Mrs. J. C. Taylor, who was as- sociated with him in church and Sunday School work, said of him, "He was one of the finest Christian gentlemen I ever knew."
