Mayor Dill Delivers Address At Business Women's Club

George W. Dill, Jr., mayor of Morehead City, delivered the address at the monthly meeting of the Carteret Business and Professional Women's club Tuesday night.

The club met in the court house, Beaufort, following dinner at the Carolina Grill.

Topic of Mayor Dill's address was the financial status of Morehead City. He explained that the town in 1925 borrowed a million and a half dollars and with this money paved streets and built the municipal building.

Until the depression these bonds were retired regularly. Then after the crash an attempt was made to renew the moray and bondholders did not push the town because value of the bonds was way below par, continued the mayor.

To get the town back on its feet after the depression, the bonds were refunded, which cost a tremendous sum of money, the mayor related. But now Morehead City is getting back on its feet, Mr. Dill added happily. The debt stands at present at approximately

ly \$650,000 and bonds are being bought regularly. Also the town has grown and there is more taxable property, about four million dollars worth of it, said Mr. Dill. At present the \$2 tax rate paid by each Morehead citizen on every \$100 assessed valuation is appropriated as follows: 85 cents-debt service, 10 cents-Port Terminal, 5 cents-hospital, and \$1—operating expenses of the town.
