

From Hollywood 'Key Largo' Moves at Pace Relentless as a Hurricane

HOLLYWOOD—"Key Largo" is a giddy gangster movie. Humphrey Bogart snarls, Lionel Barrymore growls, Edward G. Robinson sneers, and Lauren Bacall spits (once) in Robinson's face. For this sort of thing, it's excellently done and maintains a pace as relentless as the hurricane in which it takes place.

Robinson is again the "Little Caesar" type, with cigar, red, and scowl, who bellows: "Now, listen—I don't want any trouble!" He plays Johnny Rocco, deported gangster now sneaking back into the U. S. with several henchmen to set up postwar rackets. They're "hol'd up in a rickety hotel on the largest of the Florida keys. Bogart is a war hero just dropping by to see his dead buddy's invalid father (Barrymore) who runs the hotel. Bogart finds an answer to his bitter disillusionment in his meeting with Rocco. Bacall plays Barrymore's widowed daughter-in-law.

Director John Huston again shows the novel zip that he put into "Treasure of the Sierra Madre." A telling closeup has Robinson yapping at Bogart while being shaved. Robinson's inaudible whispering to Bacall are far more effective than dialogue.

Clare Trevor makes the most of her role as Robinson's drink-muddled moll. An assortment of thugs includes Thomas Gomez, who gets menace even into his incessant chewing of gum.

"Man Eater of Kumaon" is a nerve-racking tale in which an American doctor (Wendell Corey) tries to find himself after an unhappy marriage, by hunting tigers in India. His poor aim shoots off a tiger's claw. The tiger, unable to overtake its natural prey, turns to eating the turbaned natives and their shrieking wives.

Corey takes a boy thus orphaned to Sabu and his bride (Joanne Page) in another village. The tiger attacks the bride. Corey, who is unsurpassed at registering embittered boredom, finally realizes it is his duty to kill the man-eater. It'll give your kids nightmares.
