Takes Winning Prep Record On To His College Grid Coach Job

WHITE PLAINS, N. C. — (AP) — He isn't landing in a bigtime post, such as Paul Brown did when he made his now-famous vault from Massillon, Ohio, scholastic ranks to Ohio State. But Len Walters, who becomes William College's head grid coach this fall, carries about as glossy a scholastic coaching record into collegiate ranks as any mentor who ever made the jump.

Walters has signed a three-year pact as varsity grid coach, freshman baseball mentor and associate professor in the physical education department at the Williams-

town, Mass., member of the tradition-steeped "Little Three," after 16 seasons at White Plains High School where his Tiger elevens lost just 25 games, while winning 104 and tying seven.

That is a fancy 306 won-lost percentage, but the former Springfield (Mass.) College three-star star's lifetime coaching percentage is even glossier. His grid products won 167, tied nine and lost only 35 games in 24 seasons. Besides 16 White Plains campaigns, Walters served six years at Oneida, N. Y. High, where he launched his coaching career in 1922; one at Baldwin High on Long Island and one (1944) at Bunker Hill (Ind.) Naval Air station where his eleven won eight and lost one.

Walters and his coaching aids, Glenn Loucks, who remains at White Plains, turned out six unbeaten White Plains teams, three of them also untied, and captured Westchester circuit titles galore—until other conferences' fees dropped the Bengals from their slates because of White Plains' strength.

This has necessitated an international flavor into Tiger schedules. Terms from Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Massachusetts, New Jersey, western New York and Washington, D. C., have made up for absence of nearby opponents. Last fall, White Plains posted inter-sectional victories over Alliances, Ohio; Hazle Township

of Hazleton, Pa., and Union-Endicott of Endicott, N. Y.

The remarkable feature is that, prior to Walters' arrival at White Plains in the fall of 1929, football was in the doldrums here. From 1927-28, Tiger elevens won 29, lost 31 and tied six—below the .500 mark. Walters' first team won six, lost two and his second one took nine straight in the regular season, rolling up 218 points to 18 for the nine rivals. It invaded Miami for a New Year's Day game, forerunner of the current Orange Bowl college scraps, and bowed to a crack eleven of hand-picked

Florida scholastic All-Stars. The next season found the Tiggers also unbeaten and untied and the regular season play unbeaten string was run through 27 games. Walters is ideally suited on every count for his new post at the small, heavily-traditioned college in the Berkshires.
Some followers of the Cleveland Indians think Larry Dobbs, Negro centerfielder, will be one of the stars of the American League in a few years.
