OF ALL the people who knew Babe Ruth none knew him better than Ed Barrow. Barrow managed the Boston Red Sox from 1918 through 1920 and was familiar with Ruth's antics off the field. One night when the team visited Washington, Barrow stayed up all night to catch Ruth breaking training rules. At six a.m. Barrow stormed into Ruth's room to find Babe smoking a pipe with the bed covers up to his neck. "I've been here all night," Ruth said. "I like to smoke this early every morning."

With that Barrow pulled back the covers and found what he had expected. Ruth was fully dressed, even to his shoes. The next day Ruth was suspended. "But you couldn't suspend a man like that for very long," Barrow once said. "He loved the game too much." Ruth was unhappy in January 1920 when Owner Harry Frazee, in need of money, sold the Babe to the Yankees for \$125,000. Ruth began in Boston and had the place in his heart. But the Babe must have taken real pride in himself his first two years as a Yankee for he hit 54 home runs in 1920 and 59 in 1921, and every drive he hit helped

wipe off the stigma of the Chicago Black Sox Scandal of 1919. In 1923 Ruth had another great year. Yankee Stadium opened that April and the \$3,000,000 park came to be known as "The House that Ruth Built." Ruth was in all his glory, a new park and new honors. He batted .333 and was voted the Most Valuable Player in the American League. A Columbia professor once gave Ruth some 20 tests in reactions, such as coordination, hearing and eyesight. When it was over the professor said: "He's one man out of a million."

Plans Completed This Week For Tar Heels Afloat Cruise

Plans for the first mass cruise of Tar Heels Afloat, an organization made up of pleasure craft owners in North Carolina, were being completed this week, according to Cruise Commodore Charles N. Bennett.

He stated that approximately 50 pleasure craft owners, including yachts and cruisers ranging from 30 to 70 feet in length, had indicated they would take part in the event. The flotilla will rendezvous at

Morehead City Yacht Basin Saturday, September 4. Here owners and their guests will be entertained that afternoon at a Dunes club party and later will be guests at Carolina Racing association's dog track.

First section of the flotilla will be underway at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning with the upper reaches of Trent river, a tributary of the Neuse, as the destination. Second squadron of the flotilla made up of speedier vessels, will depart from Morehead City Yacht Basin about noon.

The cruise up Adams creek (inland waterway) and the Neuse is so timed that the great mass of pleasure boats will arrive in New Bern's historic harbor simultaneously during mid-afternoon.

Here the great fleet will be photographed from the air by Theodore Baxter. From New Bern the flotilla will proceed up the Trent river with some of the craft going to Pollocksville before returning to Trent Pines club and the East Carolina Yacht club anchorage for an overnight stop.

A banquet will be served the yachtsmen and pleasure boat owners and guests at Trent Pines club that evening with Fred Miles as host. Lavish entertainment is planned by Col. A. T. Willis, Commodore of the East Carolina Yacht club and his associates for the visiting yachtsmen.

On Monday morning the flotilla will return to Morehead City arriving Labor Day afternoon.
