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Yvonne De Carlo Has Same Quality As Rita Hayworth, 'Down-to-Earth'

HOLLYWOOD — Yvonne de Carlo through the eyes of her movie costume designer, Yvonne Wood: "She hates dancing. Wants to be a dramatic actress. Has a poor walk, the sort of slouch you see at the beach. She has no flair for clothes. But she has glamour — not the upon-a-pestal but the down-to-earth type. Rita Hayworth has the same quality. And that's what ninety-nine out of a hundred men like. Why should she worry about that one man who doesn't?"

I dunno. She can't mean me. Lou Costello is the most serious little fat man in the world when discussing his and Bud Abbott's forthcoming movie short. It's called "10,000 Kids and a Cop" and carries the theme: go to a policeman, sonny, when you're in trouble. Jimmy Stewart did the narrating for nothing. Lou told me on the "Mexican Hayride" set. Bill Bendix played the cop and Brenda Joyce a youth-center director with out charge. Proceeds of the 15-minute film will be used to pay off a \$50,000 mortgage on the Lou Costello, Jr. Youth Foundation recreation center here, to which Bud and Lou have turned over some \$400,000.

David Butler, who puts a punishing 252 pounds on his office swivel chair, is also a heavyweight in

movie-directing talent. Dave says pictures' crying need today is simplicity. "Simple stories of American life — the Will Rogers type of thing." Dave directed five of Rogers' films, also five early Shirley Temple's. "Producers should be making pictures for the great middle class who go to second-run theaters," Dave argues soundly.
