V. M. Kersey Wins \$225 For Original Suggestion

During the latter part of 1946 V. M. Kersey, Quarterman AMG, Overhaul and Repair Department submitted a beneficial suggestion relative to a universal alignment jig for small control surfaces. This suggestion makes more efficient the operation of repairing structural members of aircraft. Prior to adoption of this suggestion it was necessary to have an individual jig for each type of structure to be repaired.

A great amount of work by the Engineers, and others, was required to develop the idea. Their time was well spent, for use of the suggestion proved a saving of over \$4,000.00 per year for the Overhaul and Repair Department.

Mr. Kersey was awarded \$225 for originating the idea and informing management of it.

Recently the Navy Department informed the station that all other naval activities have been informed of Mr. Kersey's idea and the details of the jig developed here.

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
