COLLEGE STATION, Raleigh-Pointing out that farm fires last year cost 100 million dollars, killed 3,500 farm residents, and injured thousands, H. M. Ellis, Extension agricultural engineering specialist at State College, today urged rural North Carolinisms to take an active part in National Fire Pre-

vention Week, October 3-9. "Ninety per cent of all farm fires are preventable," Mr. Ellis declared. "Each rural family should attempt to eliminate all home, and thus reduce the staggering losses in human life and property which are sustained each in good condition.

Information from the National Board of Fire Underwriters reveals that lightning is the leading cause of farm fires, accounting for tainers. Store paint and paint ma-37 per cent of the total, Mr. Ellis said. He added that lightning rods of the right size and material pro-
