Navy Squad Undefeated After 6-0 Victory; Stein and Moody Star

CAMP LEJEUNE, Oct. 30 —The Amphibs of Little Creek, Va., Naval base today defeated the Lejeune Marines, 6-0, in a closely contested game to remain in the undefeated column.

After a scoreless half, the Amphibs recovered a Marine fumble in Lejeune's own 35 and drove through to score in the third period on runs by Schuler and Thomas.

Lejeune lost its one scoring opportunity in the third quarter as they failed to drive over from the four-yard marker on three successive power plays.

Dick Stein, Marine fullback, and co Moody did a great job of blocking the line for the Marines. Steve Van Orman and Shuler were outstanding for the Amphibs.

NOTICE TO ALL CITIZENS AND BUSINESSMEN OF THE TOWN OF MOREHEAD CITY

BE IT ORDAINED that on and after June 1st, 1944, every tenant, head of family, or other resident of the Town of Morehead City, and every manager, operator, or owner of a place of business doing business in the corporate limits of said town shall have at his or her place of residence and or place of business, a garbage or trash receptacle large enough to receive and contain all garbage, trash, or other waste material accumulating at said residence or place of business, said receptacle to be placed and kept at all times, when being used, in some place convenient for the garbage collectors, as for instance, some alley, property or street line, or other suitable place, and said receptacle to be covered at all times by a lid sufficient to keep out flies and or other germ or filth-carrying insects.

Every person, firm, or corporation violating this ordinance shall be fined \$1.00, with costs, for the first offense, and \$5.00 and costs for each additional offense, and each successive day this violation shall continue shall be considered a separate offense.
