Mr. Hood, on the editorial staff of the Pittsburgh Press, was editor of the Beaufort News in 1942. He was born in Morehead City in 1917.

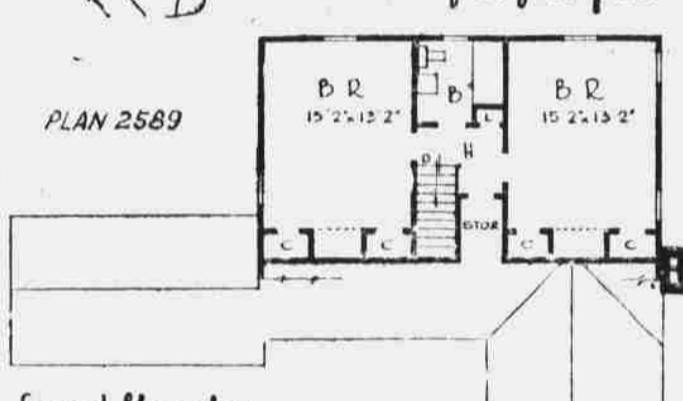
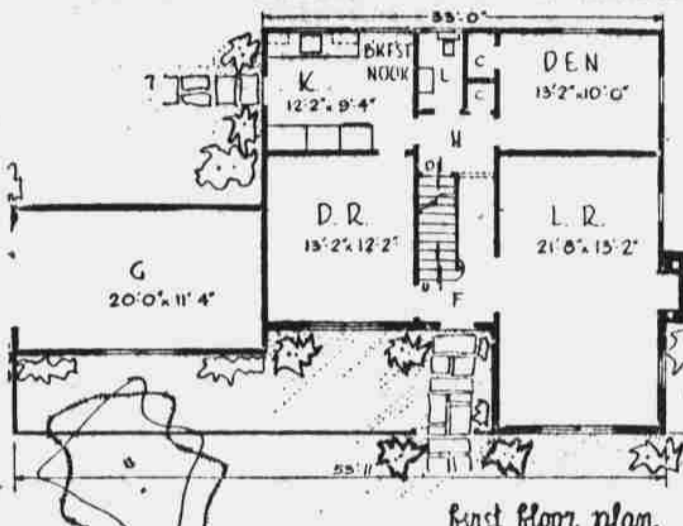
Mrs. Hood is the former Miss Elizabeth Wallace, of Lebanon County, Pa.

Craven County Soon Will Have Curb Market

Craven County's long-felt need for an up-to-date, supervised curb market will be met in the near future. Miss Jessie Trowbridge, home demonstration agent for the State College Extension Service, reported this week.

New Bern city aldermen have voted to donate a lot and contribute \$3,000 toward the market, and another \$3,000 has been appropriated by the county commissioners. Blue prints provided by the Extension Service are now being studied and adapted to local conditions by the New Bern city engineer.

The proposed building will be 40 by 88 feet in size and will be constructed of concrete blocks. A concrete floor will be poured. Doors wide enough for trucks to pass through will be placed at each end of the building. Rest rooms will be provided, and windows will be placed along the front and back walls. Plenty of parking space will be available near the building.

The new market, which will be the 38th to be organized in North Carolina, will be a home demonstration curb market. Sellers will offer only products which they have grown or made themselves. Directors selected by the sellers, will set up regulations governing the operation of the market.

Many farm families of Craven have signed agreements to sell on the market. Mrs. I. L. Heath of Cove City was the first to show her intention of selling "on opening day and each Saturday thereafter for a period of three months." Vegetables, fruits, poultry, eggs, meat, flowers, and baked products will be among the items offered for sale.

The New Bern Chamber of Commerce laid the groundwork for the market plans several years ago. The Junior Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, and Rotary Club market committees, under the direction of Dr. W. L. Hand, Jr., gave the necessary push and started the ball rolling.
