Farmer Prefers Good Sow To Four Acres Tobacco

COLLEGE STATION, Raleigh— "I'd rather have one good brood sow than four acres of tobacco," says C. H. Holland of Kemansville, Duplin county farmer who has sold \$1,820 worth of finished pigs from two sows in the past 12 months.

According to L. F. Weeks, county agent for the State College Extension Service, Mr. Holland grows his own hog feed except for a small amount of protein supplement. He says that the labor requirement for growing this feed and feeding it to the hogs is distributed evenly throughout the year instead of being concentrated in one short period as in the case of tobacco or other crops.

On the Holland farm year-round grazing is produced not only for hogs but also for work stock, poultry, and cattle.

Mr. Holland's choice Hampshire sow has produced nine litters averaging 12 pigs each, or a total of 108 pigs in four and a half years.
