North Carolina Collects \$214,073 in Beer Taxes

Beer taxes collected by the State in March totaled \$214,073.94, the State Department of Revenue reported today.

Total collections for the first three months of 1949 total \$1,031,455.16. Half of the excise tax is distributed annually to counties and municipalities which license beer sales.

The tax totals do not include the State sales tax on beer or license taxes levied by the Federal and local governments.
