Kinston Woman Files Suit Against A&EC Road

KINSTON—Helen Sarah Robinson, Kinston Negress who is administratrix of the estate of the late Clarence Robinson, Negro, has filed suit in Lenoir county superior court asking \$25,000 damages from the Atlantic and East Carolina Railroad company.

Robinson, in the employ of the railroad company as a section hand, was fatally injured Oct. 24 when a rail motor car on which he and several others were riding was struck near Dover by a train owned and operated by the Atlantic and East Carolina Railroad company.

The complaint alleges that the train under the supervision and control of L. S. Potter, engineer, and J. H. Spruill, conductor, was being operated in a "careless, reckless, negligent and heedless manner . . . and without due regard for the safety of its (the railway's) employees."
