ers and some right sizeable property owners. This is a very worthwhile project and one we citizens should think considerable about. In my estimation there is no way for an individual to get quite as close to another as through hours of recreation.

I prize very much the happy days I have spent out in the open with some mighty good men, with men from several walks of life and it is so interesting to note the likeness in men. I have spent days with professional men, with educated men, in fact, educators, then with those less fortunate who for one reason or another never acquired much education.

I am more convinced as I grow older that all men are born equal and the more times I can spend with my good friends when we are not driving for money as we necessarily must in our business or professions, the more I love that companion. I am quite sure that I have never spent a day in the woods or fields or on a stream or at a camp when I did not see some good traits in my companions which I longed to have.

If all people are born equal and their likenesses so parallel, would it not be true that recreation in some form would be good for their relationship, their health and their soul? Most of us believe in and love our churches and schools, but we know that the programs in both are so filled that there is no time for recreation. How else will it be provided?

None other than by us, the people of this town and by our paying the same few cents a year in taxes that we are now paying. If we do not pay this title, few of us will know the difference in our bank account.

I sincerely believe we have the right kind of recreation program here and I would not suggest any kind except under the direction of a trained supervisor. We will feel a different relationship with our fellowmen.

I have figures to show that some 40 thousand teenagers enjoyed fun and play in our recreational center for the last two years, chaperoned by the good women of this town. All total, around 90,000 people visited the building. I have no record of any person leaving the building any worse by having attended. Four thousand dollars is the amount involved in this recreation.

I am told that the biggest single item of cost to our government today is that of handling crime. I am also told that a true sportsman never commits a major crime.

Friends, think about this and vote according to your convictions.

**Reds Order Chinese Movie Stars to Cut Out Glamour**

HONG KONG.—(AP) — Most of China's movie stars have agreed to cut out the glamour. Eighty-two leading Chinese actors and actresses are reported by the leftist newspaper Ta Kung Pao to have expressed willingness to adhere to a "laboring life pact."

All 82 have taken refuge in Hong Kong which today is China's Hollywood. Before the Communists overran the mainland, Shanghai was the film capital of China. Since the Red occupation of the city, however, the distinction has come to this British crown colony.

Hong Kong's film industry is not subject to Red laws but has found it necessary to fall into line with the Communists. Red China is the principal market. All films must pass Red censors.
