Although marshmallow as a food is as old as the pyramids, we moderns make ample use of our fluffy marshmallows in varied and appetizing recipes. Using the electric range and electric refrigerator, you can prepare many delicious desserts, sauces, salads, candies, cookies and frozen desserts with marshmallows as the basic ingredient.

Marshmallow Fruit Pyramids
(Makes 8 servings)
One No. 2 can sliced pineapple, one No. 2 1/2 can peach halves, 12 marshmallows.

Drain pineapple and peaches separately. Reserve 2/3 cup peach sirup for this recipe. Use remaining fruit sirup for beverages, etc. In large shallow baking dish, arrange eight slices of pineapple. Top with peach halves, hollow sides up. Place one or two marshmallows in center of each peach half. Pour 2/3 cup peach sirup into baking dish. Bake in moderate oven (375) 10 minutes, basting occasionally. Serve hot.

Choco Mint Marshmallow Sauce
(Makes 2/3 cup sauce)
Two 1 1/2 ounce chocolate covered mint patties, 16 marshmallows, 1/4 cup water, dash of salt.

Dice mint patties. In a saucepan, combine mint patties, whole marshmallows, water and salt. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until marshmallows are melted. Let mixture boil gently three min-

utes. Serve hot or warm over ice cream, cake or custard.
Foolproof Fudge
(Makes about 2 1/2 pounds)
32 marshmallows, 1/4 cup water, 2 1/2 cups sugar, 1/4 lb. butter, one 6 ounce can evaporated milk, 1/4 teaspoon salt, one and 1/4 6 ounce packages of semi-sweet chocolate bits.

In top of double boiler, combine marshmallows and water; cook over boiling water until marshmallows are melted, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile in a heavy saucepan, combine sugar, butter, milk and salt; mix thoroughly. Bring to rolling boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Continue boiling for eight minutes, stirring constantly to prevent mixture from sticking to bottom of pan. Remove from heat and stir in melted marshmallows and chocolate bits. Mix until thoroughly blended and the chocolate bits are melted. Pour into buttered 8 by 12 inch pan. Cool thoroughly and cut into squares.

Paris (AP)—A DeGaulist deputy has asked the French parliament to adopt legislation limiting the publicity given to films banned to those under 16, which he describes as "spectacular, rowdy and provoking."
