Delaware Explores Carolina Waters

North Carolina and federal fisheries officials and members of the North Carolina Fisheries Association met at the Fish and Wildlife Lab, Pivers Island, Saturday morning. Stewart Springer, chief branch of exploratory fishing, gave a general review of operations of the Delaware off the North Carolina coast.

Mr. Springer said that the Delaware had made 25 drags from Harkers south during the first part of the week. The drags were made at depths ranging from 20 to 250 fathoms.

He discussed the various types of fish caught at specific depths and asked the fishermen present if the findings of the Delaware coincided with their experiences. He also asked the fishermen to point out areas they were interested in having the Delaware explore. The area offshore between the 50 and 75 fathom depths is definitely tropical, according to Mr. Springer, who said the Delaware caught numbers of tropical fish such as angel fish and butterfly fish.

In one drag off Cape Lookout the Delaware landed 200 sharks, he said. Good quantities of flounder and snapper were reported off Lookout.

Members of the crew on the Delaware are Mr. Springer, J. L. Squire, Ernest Medico and Francis Captiva.

The Delaware will continue exploratory fishing in this area for about two more weeks.

The meeting was originally scheduled to be aboard the Delaware at Morehead City port. Because of the rough weather, however, the Delaware stayed out at sea.

S. A. Chalk Jr. Directs Church Visitation Program

CP&L Answers Accusations On High Rates

Carolina Power & Light Co. today cited record-breaking North Carolina growth to show that its power rates have not retarded industrial development, as was charged by a group of industrial customers.

CP&L filed an answer to the complaint with the N. C. Utilities Commission, asserting that industrial growth and community development have broken all previous records in its North Carolina service area since 1948, when the questioned rate went into effect.

The company pointed out that it is subject to regulation by the commission, and that the rates were reviewed and approved by the commission. It asked the Commission to dismiss the complaint and rule that its industrial rates are "just and reasonable."

The answer reported a total of \$414,882,500 invested in new and expanded plants in CP&L's North Carolina service area since 1948. These expenditures were credited with the following economic results: 54,144 new jobs; financial support for 160,000 more people through additional payrolls of \$129,763,000; \$319,485,000 more personal income; and \$146,205,000 more bank deposits and \$194,940,000 more retail sales per year.

In addition to industrial development activities, CP&L conducts its finer Carolina community improvement program which has won participation from 20,000 individuals in 2,546 projects in 172 North Carolina communities.

CP&L said it has invested heavily in new and expanded facilities to meet demands of industrial and community growth. Since 1948 it has spent more than \$180,000,000 for this purpose in North Carolina, and will spend some \$19,000,000 for N. C. expansions in 1958.

Growth is also reflected in steadily increasing industrial power consumption. Between March 31, 1948, and the end of 1957 industrial power usage in CP&L's North Carolina area rose 86 per cent, from 559,902,536 kilowatt-hours, to 1,041,146,642 kilowatt-hours.

County Commissioners Consider Road Matters

Six road matters were considered by the county commissioners at their meeting yesterday morning at the courthouse, Beaufort.

A letter from C. Y. Griffin, highway official at New Bern, stated that there is no way, under the present highway merit system, that the Lockhart road, west of Morehead City, can qualify for state maintenance.

Another letter from Mr. Griffin dealt with the Sleepy Creek road at Gloucester. Since that road is not on the highway system, he said the state could not make a traffic count there, as the commissioners had requested at their last meeting.

The Adams Creek road at Broad Creek was discussed. Moses Howard, chairman, said that he believes that the Adams Creek road will be put on the system soon.

Roads Lead to Water

Commissioner Skinner Chalk pointed out that all three roads lead to the water and that therefore they have a public service qualification that should be considered by the state. The board passed a resolution requesting that the state recognize this fact.

Chairman Howard said the Lockhart road will be investigated further. "We're not satisfied with the decision on that," he remarked.

It was suggested that persons interested in the Sleepy Creek Road confer with J. L. Humphrey, county road superintendent, who will outline right-of-way requirements and other regulations relative to adding it to the system.

Road to Hotel

The board went on record approving maintenance of Mansfield Parkway by owners of the Morehead Biltmore Hotel, providing that maintenance duties shall revert to the state, upon notice to the hotel owners, whenever the state feels the parkway is not being maintained properly.

The board also specified that the public shall have access to the road at all times.

The board approved a petition presented by J. M. Coats, Harkers Island. The petition requested that a road at the west end of the island be widened.

Commissioner Skinner Chalk said that he had been requested to ask that the highway department beautify the shoulders of the road leading from the beach bridge

to Atlantic Beach. Mr. Humphrey said he would take the matter up with the proper authorities.

Taxpayer Appears

W. H. Potter, Beaufort Fisheries, appeared before the board to learn whether the board had made any decision on what he termed inequitable taxation on menhaden boats. He also requested the board's interpretation of inventory on hand at a menhaden plant as of Jan. 1.

Moses Howard, chairman of the board, said the board would make a decision at its session as an equalization board March 17 and inform him by letter.

A letter from Philip Green Jr., assistant director of the Institute of Government, was read. The letter stated that a county has authority to zone parts of a county but not the entire county.

R. M. Williams, county agent, presented a copy of his report on 1957 farming activities in the county.

J. D. Potter, county accountant, presented the board with a list of 500 persons who have failed to list taxes. The board decided to publicize the names of the non-listers in the paper and ask that they list taxes.

Persons who may know of their whereabouts will be asked to notify them that they are in violation of the law for not listing. If the persons still fail to list, they will be cited to court.

The commissioners expressed regret that Walter Yeomans, Harkers Island, a member of the board of commissioners, was not present. He is in a hospital at Norfolk.
