



Another letter from Mr. Griffin dealt with the Sleepy Creek road at Gloucester. Since that road is not on the highway system, he said the state could not make a traffic count there, as the commissioners had requested at their last meet-ing

of Jan. 1. Moses Howard, chairman of the board, said the board would make a decision at its session as an equalization board March 17 and inform him by letter. A letter from Philip Green Jr., assistant director of the Institute of Government, was read. The let-ter stated that a county has au-thority to zone parts of a county but not the entire county. R. M. Williams, county agent, presented a copy of his report on 1957 farming activities in the county. The Adams Creek road at Broad Creek was discussed. Moses How-ard, chairman, said that he be-lieves that the Adams Creek road will be put on the system soon.
