3. Long-range council plans call for helping all of its local members provide more complete, more helpful home improvement service. The objective is to make it possible for homeowners to procure all the needed materials and service for various modernization projects at a variety of one-stop shops.
4. The ultimate effect of the industry's home improvement crusade will be to halt the spread of housing blight and upgrade neighborhoods, thereby bulwarking the value of every family's house investment.

The council, permanent successor to the "Operation Home Improvement" campaign undertaken as a promotional venture by manufacturers and trade associates two years ago, is in the process of organizing local Chapters throughout the country. Local chapters will, for example, organize home improvement clinics, where homeowners can get the answers to any of their improvement or modernization problems from industry experts. In some cases, they will stage exhibitions of the latest home improvement products and techniques. Members—both at the national level and the local level—have been provided the distinctive Home Improvement Council emblem for use in their advertising or their place of business to show their interest in the homeowner's improvement plans.

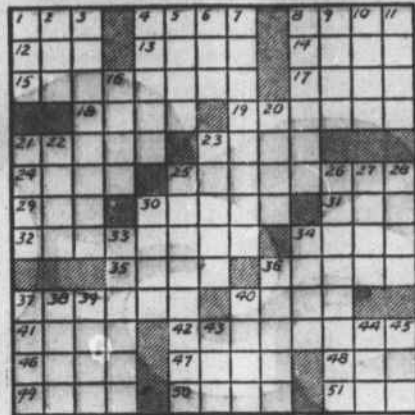
Crossword Puzzle

ESC Chairman Reports On Unemployment Fund

Raleigh — Henry E. Kendall, chairman of the Employment Security Commission, reported today that North Carolina's balance in the unemployment trust fund earned \$1,194,935.49 in interest during the fourth quarter of 1957. This brought the account's total as of the end of 1957 to \$182,207,335.49, a gain of about three million dollars over the year.

The North Carolina account in the unemployment trust fund is made up of employer contributions paid under the Employment Security Commission law. These funds are deposited with the federal treasury and can be withdrawn only for benefit payments to insured workers of North Carolina employers.
