### State Welfare Commissioner Will Speak at Woman's Club Meeting

Dr. Ellen Winston of Raleigh, state commissioner of public welfare, will speak at the Beaufort Woman's Club meeting Thursday night at the Inlet Inn. The meeting will begin with a dutch dinner at 6:30.

Anyone who is interested in welfare work is invited to hear Dr. Winston.

Dr. Winston is a native North Carolinian, having been born in Swain County. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Chicago and has held various research positions with a number of federal agencies. She has written extensively in the fields of social and economic problems.

She spent four years as head of the department of sociology and economics at Meredith College, and came from that position to the office of North Carolina Commissioner of Public Welfare on June 1, 1944.

Dr. Winston works actively on a number of state committees and commissions concerned with social welfare. Among her activities on a national basis, she has served as chairman of the Policy Committee, chairman of the Special Committee on Aid to Dependent Children, and as a vice-president of the American Public Welfare Association.

She is serving as president of the American Public Welfare Association and was a member of the Fact-Finding Committee for the Mid-century White House Conference on Children and Youth. For three years she was a member of the Slum Clearance Advisory Committee of the US Housing and Home Finance Agency and has completed a three-year term on the executive committee of the National Conference of Social Work.

She served as Chairman of Section 1 of the National Conference of Social Work for 1950-51. She is a past president of the North Carolina Conference for Social Service.

In 1948, Dr. Winston was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities by the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. In 1952, she was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by Converse College, her alma mater.
