

# Morehead City Eagles Lose to Pamlico Central

The Morehead City Eagles dropped a 6-5 decision to Pamlico Central Thursday afternoon at Bayboro. The Eagles outhit the winners 10 hits to four but walks and errors by the Eagles gave Pamlico the edge.

The Eagles scored one run in the first inning and one in the second before Pamlico could push a run across. Pamlico struck back with one run in the third and three in the fourth.

### Score Tied

The Eagles tied the score at four all in the fifth inning and forged ahead, 6-5, in the top of the sixth. Pamlico scored one in the bottom of the sixth and one more in the seventh to clinch the game.

Eagle Coach Norman Clark said his boys hit well but had some severe lapses in the field. Gary Guthrie, third baseman, was the only infielder to go through the game without an error.

Second sacker Jackie Simpson made three errors, shortstop Walter Morris hit two and first baseman John Glancy had one error chalked up against him.
