General Biney, who commands the second wing, pinned stars on the shoulders of Brig. Gen. John P. Condon, with Mrs. Condon assisting (see photo above).

The new general and his family will travel to Paris, France, where he will serve with the US European Command. The Condons have three daughters, Aline, 20, and 18 year-old twins, Mary and Jane.

General Condon was first commissioned in May 1934 upon graduation from the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md. He later attended flight training at Pensacola, Fla., and received his wings in 1937.

General Condon was with MAG-12 when the unit moved overseas to the Solomon Islands in the early months of World War II. He participated in the Defense of Guadalcanal and the Russell Islands and also in the New Georgia operation.

During the Korean conflict, General Condon served overseas with the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

In February 1956, General Condon reported to the Second Marine Air Wing, Cherry Point, where he assumed the chief of staff position. After serving in that office for approximately 18 months, he was assigned to duty as assistant wing commander.

Perhaps equal in importance is the fact that irrigators themselves recognize the problems they are creating and appear to be willing to cooperate in eliminating those problems.

Still another encouraging factor is the interest irrigators have shown in developing economical means of using sub-surface water for their purpose. Experts contend that more water is stored underground than in all the streams and reservoirs on the surface and that this water is ideally suited to irrigation in most instances.

The main difficulty here is a lack of information regarding the occurrence of ground water. State and federal agencies are cooperating to obtain this information as soon as possible in the belief it will relieve some of the burden now being placed on surface supplies. Irrigators stand to benefit tremendously from this knowledge.



Word has been received here of the death in California on March 31 of Dr. B. M. Harding, a former resident for a few years of Ocracoke.


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Upstate Jaycees To Visit Here
