Housewife Wins Scholarship

Louisville, Ky. (AP)—Judy O'Bannon, a 22-year-old blonde, is the first full-time woman student in the 104-year history of the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary.

The attractive Judy is the wife of Frank L. O'Bannon, a young lawyer whom she met at Indiana University, and she doesn't look much like a future minister. But she won a Rockefeller scholarship entitling her to a year of study toward a Bachelor of Divinity degree, and she selected the seminary here.

Judy admits frankly that she probably will never be ordained as a minister, because:

"People don't want to listen to a woman preach."

But she thinks she would like to teach in a religious school, and adds:

"Even if I don't go on and get my degree, I will have learned how to be a better citizen, a better wife and—when the time comes—a better mother."

Judy does not feel self-conscious about being the only woman student in an otherwise all-male school. She says the students must like her, because they have elected her secretary-treasurer of her class.

The O'Bannons live at nearby Croysden, Ind., where Judy is a busy housewife in the hours before and after classes.

DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE!

The town of Morehead City, through its Police Department, is proceeding to vigorously enforce the "Dog Ordinance", Chapter J, Articles IV, Town Code, as of 1 May 1958. This announcement, together with pertinent sections of the ordinance, is being advertised so that dog owners will be fully advised, stray dogs eliminated, and licensed pets protected.

Sections 2, 3, 5 and 7: Every owner shall register his dog with the City Clerk prior to May 1, pay a license fee in the amount of \$2.00, and receive a metal identification tag, which tag shall be kept attached to the dog's collar.

Section 8: Every owner or keeper of a dog shall have such dog inoculated against rabies at least once each year, and present such certificate to the City Clerk.

Sections 9, 11: Dogs running at large, particularly females in heat, and all unlicensed dogs shall be impounded, and kept for five days, and if not redeemed by the owner, eliminated. Redemption fees, board and licensing shall be paid by the owners, including vaccination fees if required.
