P. H. Geer Jr. to Direct Toastmasters Meeting

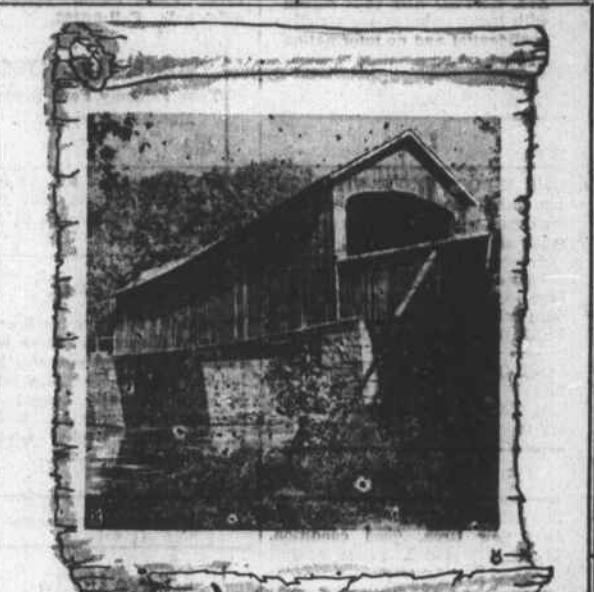
