It is the hour of sunrise on Friday, April 25, 1962. From the rampart of Fort Macon, the Stars and Bars is being run up. The morning breeze brings the notes of reveille across the waters of Bogue Sound. The sound is heard by early risers in Morehead City and Beaufort.

Among the sand dunes, some distance from the fort, men in blue are taking their stations at the several mortars and cannons behind the heavy breastworks of sand, awaiting the signal for action.

Within the fort there is a scene of anticipated assault, for a demand for surrender had been refused by the officer in command. The notes of the bugle had hardly faded when out of the sand dunes came the first blast from the enemy, starting the day's battle. The assault ended at sunset when a white flag from the rampart of the fort signaled a halt in the battle. Terms of surrender were accepted on Saturday, April 26.
