The Rev. Mr. Sharp closed the meeting with prayer, after which refreshments were served by Mrs. Jerry Darling.

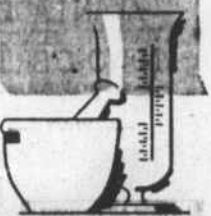
Humphreys-Willis
