


The House of the Week

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

Attends Convention

Complete separation of living and sleeping areas is achieved in this ranch house by a unique adaptation of the split level idea to a single level house.

Instead of splitting the areas by the use of higher and lower levels, the split idea is carried out by a front-to-back arcade which slices through the center of the house.

The end result of the plan, designed especially for the House of the Week series and designated X-8, is a sharp division of activity and sleeping areas.

The arcade, itself, is split into three parts — a covered entry, an entry foyer and an outdoor living patio — and all parts are sheltered by a roof.

Architect Samuel Paul, who created design X-8, got his inspiration for the underlying concept of this plan from a quotation of obscure or unknown origin:

"Neither shall their sleep be disturbed nor their activity be curtailed."

"This sums it up," Paul says, adding:

"One unit consists of rooms where work, dining, recreation, conversation and activity of one sort or another is going on. The activity in this area varies from noisy in the family room to subdued sounds in the living room."

"The other unit consists of sleeping rooms where quiet and privacy are the prime requisites." Contrasting Use of Space

In his arrangement, the architect has made contrasting use of space within the two principal areas.

An open plan prevails in the activity area, whereas the sleeping area is enclosed by sharply defined walls.

In the activity area, all five rooms flow into each other in a circle of open space.

The circle starts at the entrance foyer, curves toward the living and dining rooms, then into the informal dining and family room, the kitchen and the coffee room—then back to the entrance foyer.

The curve of the circle is broken occasionally by accordion partitions.

The dining room can be shut off from the informal dining-family room by one partition; the coffee room can be closed off from the entrance foyer by another partition.

Thus the partitions close off the work and noisy areas from the formal, quieter area.

Engineers Set Hurricane Hearing Date for June 16

A public hearing on hurricane studies affecting the area from Carteret County and the coastal areas of Onslow, Pender and New Hanover Counties down to Wrightsville Beach is scheduled to be held by the Corps of Engineers at Beaufort June 16 at 10:30 a.m. at the school.

Announcement of the hearing was made Tuesday by Col. H. C. Rowland Jr., district engineer of the Corps' Wilmington District. Colonel Rowland will preside and will be assisted by staff engineers in conducting the hearing.

The Beaufort hearing is one of several being held in the state's coastal area for the purpose of assembling information on damages imposed by hurricanes and measures to prevent such damages.

Colonel Rowland explained that Public Law 71 authorizes and directs the Secretary of the Army, in cooperation with the Secretary of Commerce and other Federal agencies concerned with hurricanes, "to cause an examination and survey to be made of the eastern and southern seaboard of the United States with respect to hurricanes with particular reference to areas where severe damages have occurred."

This phase constitutes the preliminary examination which will determine if a detailed survey is warranted.

He said further that the law provides that the survey be made under direction of the Corps of Engineers and "shall include the securing of data on the behavior and frequency of hurricanes, and the determination of methods of forecasting their paths and improving warning services, and of possible means of preventing loss of human lives and damage to property, with due consideration of the economics of proposed breakwaters, sea walls, dikes, dams, and other structures, warning services or other measures which might be required."

The district engineer added that all interested persons are urged to be present or represented including federal, state, county, municipal agencies, and commercial, civic, highway interests and property owners concerned.

House Design Calls For Eight Rooms

House of the Week design has eight rooms, 2 1/2 baths and foyer. The living area includes living room with attached outdoor living patio, dining room, informal dining-family room, kitchen, coffee room and lavatory. Three bedrooms and two baths are in the sleeping area. The overall dimensions of the house are 36 by 61 feet. A minimum plot 80 by 100 feet is recommended. There are 1,732 sq. ft. in the living and sleeping areas. The covered entry has 90 sq. ft., the entry foyer 144 sq. ft., and the outdoor living patio 140 sq. ft.

The master bedroom is secluded from all other bedrooms and from all other parts of the house.

A bank of closets on one wall creates a buffer between the outdoor living patio and the master bedroom. Another wall has staggered studs for insulation to make it sound resistant.

A bending bedroom hall likewise contributes to privacy — no bedroom door is visible from the entrance foyer, and the hall bath, artificially ventilated, has its entrance door concealed.

Glassed-in Entrance Foyer
In the arcade, a covered entry leads to the glassed-in entry foyer. Here you can look through a glass wall to the outdoor living patio and beyond into a garden.

The kitchen separates the family and coffee rooms — and a two-way fireplace separates the living and dining rooms.

Construction economies are achieved by building the sleeping area over crawl space. The arcade is slab on grade with slate flooring. A full basement is below the living area.

Exterior details include a simple roof line, vertical wood siding with large window areas, and roof overhangs. Brick or stone may be substituted for the exterior if desired.

Optional materials are possible for the roof; use either tabbed down asphalt shingles or built-up roofing with marble chip finish.

cerning the character and extent of improvements desired for specific localities, as well as on a comprehensive plan for the entire area, and the need and advisability of their execution.

Sponsors of improvements are urged to present factual material on the general plans of improvement desired for specific localities and to give detailed supporting data and economic justification therefore.

Included in the factual information should be data on observations of unusual occurrences of beach erosion, tidal flooding, wave action, and associated hurricane damages for separate localities.

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
