Sonny Sykes Faces Manslaughter Trial In Superior Court

The first trial scheduled for the June 9 term of superior court is that of Timothy "Sonny" Sykes, charged with manslaughter and assault. A grand jury indicted Sykes during the last term of court but he has been free under a \$4,000 bond.

Sykes allegedly shot Marines Clayton B. Hall Jr. and Edward Keane in a fracas at Ann's Place, a beer joint west of Morehead City on US 70, on March 12.

Hall died at the Cherry Point hospital on March 25. Keane, who was shot in the leg, was not seriously injured.

Sykes was tried in county recorder's court. Judge Lambert Morris found probable cause and bound him over to superior court.
