Following dinner, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis entertained at their home in Mansfield Park, Morehead City. Ice cream and cake were served.

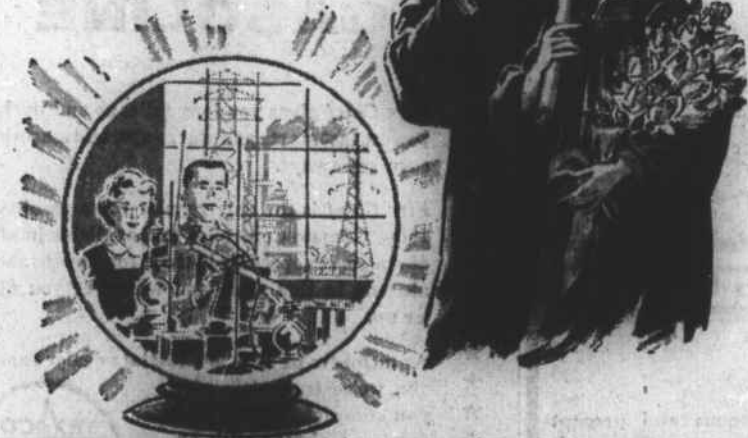

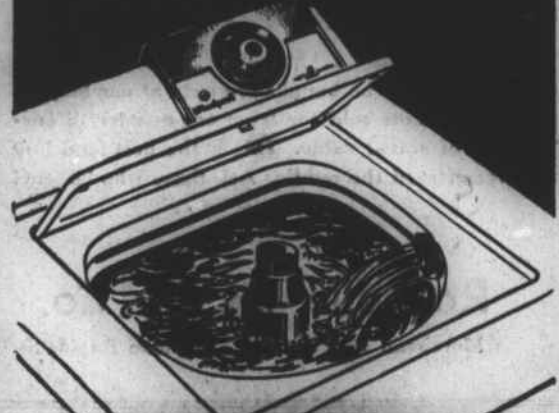
