New York (AP)—Writing for the stage is a highly popular cross-country occupation, the American Playwrights Guild reports.

The organization, formed a year ago to help new playwrights in preparation of scripts for Broadway and television, has made a survey of its correspondence, found hopeful authors in 37 states.

The guild found the greatest activity in New York State, followed by Illinois and then Pennsylvania. More than 800 scripts have been examined, with a 55 per cent majority of authors preferring to write for the theatre rather than television.

Marine Pays \$150 Fine For Hit and Run Driving

Fined \$25
