

Not to be Outdone . . .

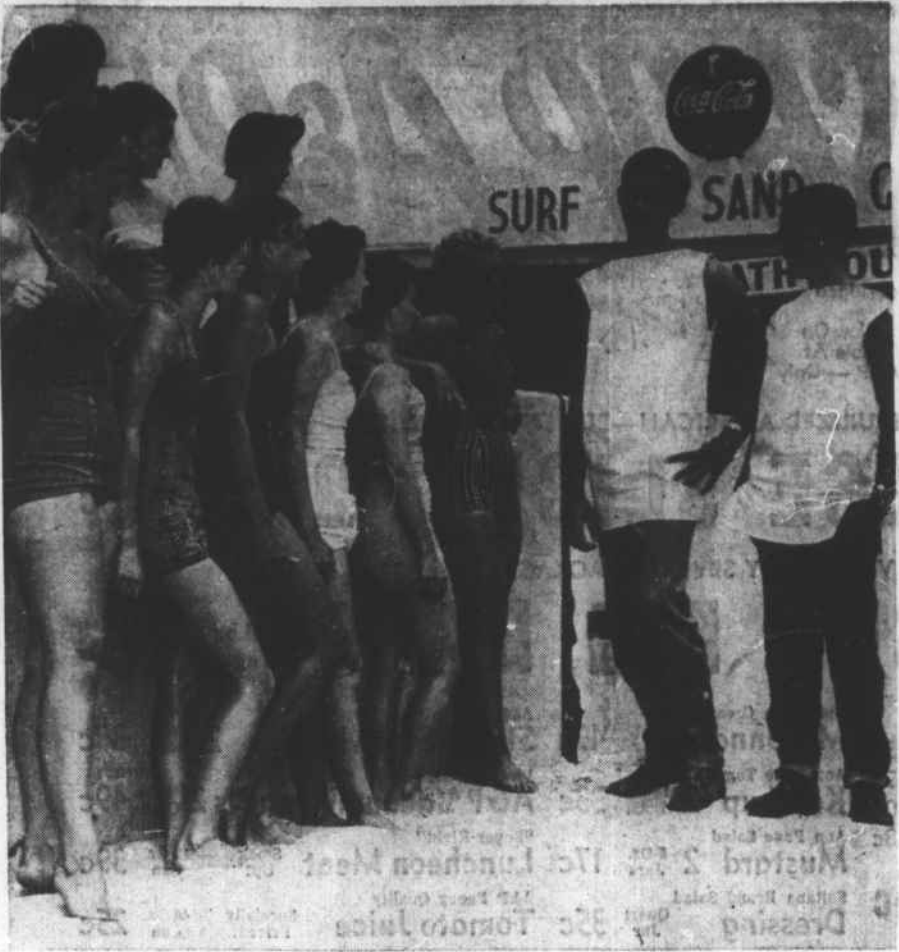
