## Chess Develops Mental Ability

Norman, Okla. (AP)—Don't discourage Junior if he takes to moving pawns, rooks and bishops around a checkered board.

He may prove to be one of America's weapons in its scientific competition with the Soviet Union.

That's the considered opinion of Jerry Spann, president of the U.S. Chess Federation.

Russians are world leaders in chess, notes Spann, and "we think there's a method in the Russian chess madness."

"Chess doesn't make brains," says Spann, "but it pinpoints those students with minds who can benefit from intensive scientific training."

"Kids take to the game and it's a perfect aptitude test. You can find talent that way which might never be known otherwise."

"Who are the best chess players?" "Mathematicians and musicians," says Spann.

Chess, he says, requires a mathematician's ability to analyze and a musician's ability to synthesize or compose.
