**Stray Cat, Morehead City, Found to be Rabid**

A stray cat, befriended by a wife of a Marine in Morehead City, died last week and has been reported by the state testing laboratory as rabid. The cat bit the woman and her husband, both of whom are reported to be taking the Pasteur treatment for rabies.

Persons who have pets in the block between 15th and 16th Streets and Evans and Arendell are asked to be on the lookout for indications of rabies in their animals.

# Morehead Chamber Sends Members Progress Report

The Morehead City Chamber of Commerce has mailed a progress report and financial statement to all chamber members. It was prepared by chamber manager Joe DuBois.

Mr. DuBois lists the following chamber projects that have been successful this year: more tourists and conventions, a longer tourist season, hurricane protection measures, closer cooperation between this county and the two Marine bases; and an industrial survey nearly ready for printing.

The following projects are now being pursued: All Seashore Highway, US 29 four lanes from Havelock new bridge across the New-Port River, new schools, more industry, a new brochure, and fall and winter advertising.

The report shows that \$6,375.30 has been spent through July 15. The total amount pledged to the chamber for 1958 was \$9,500. That leaves a potential balance of \$3,124.70 for chamber operation for the remainder of the year.

The actual balance on hand July 15 was \$65.41. Mr. DuBois says that the chamber needs over \$600 to print new brochures and at least \$500 more for advertising. He predicts that unless the chamber gets some new members there will be no funds with which to build 1959 business for this area.
