Sgt. First Class James E. Leazy, whose wife, Iola, lives at 106 Noyes Ave., Morehead City.

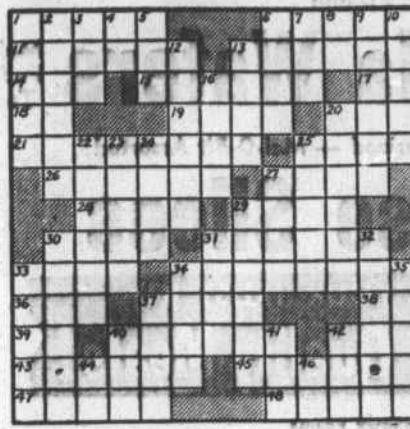
Specialist Second Class Burison W. Lawrence, son of Bonnie Lawrence, Marshallberg.

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## Direct Distance Dialing Explained to Men's Club

Direct distance dialing was explained to the Men of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church recently by Louis A. Corning III, sales manager for Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Co., Tarboro. Through use of this system, called DDD, any telephone subscriber can pick up his phone and dial any number in the United States or Canada.

Mr. Corning reported that his company is working on DDD but several things remain to be done. One of the most important, of course, is eliminating duplicate numbers. This is being done through a system of national, regional and sectional exchanges.

The United States and Canada are divided into 100 numbering areas. Within each area no numbers are duplicated. Each area has a different three-numeral code. There are two areas in North Carolina, 704 and 919.

**Tape Keeps Record**  
Another requirement for DDD will be a method of billing customers accurately and promptly. All billing information for such calls will be stored in the form of punched tape. Each day the tape will be removed and sent to a central accounting center.

In order for this system to work, another requirement is that everyone have a dial telephone. Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Co. is now 99.94 per cent dial, with plans made for converting the few remaining manual telephones.

**Complex Equipment Used**  
"To serve these dial telephones with the kind of dial equipment necessary for DDD, local offices will have to be changed," Mr. Corning pointed out. "Equipment in the offices must have the ability to set in motion electromechanical brains all over the nation," he continued.

Washington is the first city in North Carolina to have DDD. Mr. Corning predicts that all cities in his company's area will have DDD in the near future.

Mr. Corning concluded, "Before the cutover to DDD in Morehead City, we will mail a DDD directory to each telephone subscriber. The DDD directory will provide examples of how to use DDD for long distance service as well as list the other places that you may dial with their various code numbers."
