Charles R. Davis, Harkers Island, Serves on Science Panel, Washington

Charles R. Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl C. Davis, Harkers Island, has returned from Washington, D. C., where he served Aug. 8 on a panel of ten members for the President's Committee on Scientists and Engineers.

The panel was called to Washington by the American Association for the Advancement of Science to review a kit of materials prepared by the President's Committee on Scientists and Engineers for the use of counselors in science all over the country.

Panel Members
Other members of the panel included Alfred Borg, department of bacteriology, Kansas State College; Kathryn G. Cook, guidance supervisor, Arlington County Public School; Lyle Dawson, department of chemistry, University of Kentucky; Douglas Dillenbeck, director of guidance, North Shore High School, Glen Head, Long Island, N. Y.

Stanley B. Jackson, department of Mathematics, University of Maryland; Sarah L. Leiter, supervisor of pupil services, Baltimore, Md.; Lawrence Quill, department of chemistry, Michigan State University; Wayne Taylor, Extension Division, University of Texas; and the renowned Margaret Mead, of the American Museum of Natural History, New York.

The President's Committee, on which Mr. Davis served, was charged with responsibility for enlisting the cooperation of all interested individuals and groups in dealing with the problem of the shortage of scientific manpower.

The National Science Foundation was directed to provide staff services and research assistance, and to give leadership to other government departments working on the problem.

The committee had prepared a kit of materials for use by counselors in secondary schools throughout the USA and asked the AAAS to call a panel to Washington to review the kit, criticize it, and give practical suggestions.

The panel was directed by Richard Hill Byrne, American Personnel and Guidance Association; Earl Lindveit, S. Paul Shackleton and Eugene D. Vinogradoff, all of the President's Committee on Scientists and Engineers; and Dr. John R. Mayor, American Association for the advancement of Science.

Takes Part on Symposium
Mr. Davis also served on a previous assignment for the AAAS this spring when he was invited to be one of five speakers presenting a Symposium on Improvement of Science Teaching as part of the thirty-fourth annual meeting of the Southwestern and Rocky Mountain Division of the American Association for the advancement of science. The convention was held at the Institute of Scientific Research, Las Vegas, New Mexico, April 27 through May 1, 1958.

Mr. Davis presented the topic "Conceptualization in High School Physics: A Case History Approach to the Laws of Motion."
