James Jones, Newport, Returns on Saint Paul

Long Beach, Calif. — James C. Jones, gunner's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil C. Jones of Newport, returned Aug. 25 to Long Beach, Calif., aboard the heavy cruiser USS Saint Paul after completing a seven-month tour of duty in the Far East.

The Saint Paul, for six months the flagship of the US Seventh Fleet, visited ports in New Zealand, Japan, Formosa, and the Philippines during her overseas tour.

A 17,000-ton vessel, the Saint Paul has a complement of 900 officers and men.
