Called here Tuesday by the death of Mrs. Hugh C. Jones were Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Bradley of Kipling.

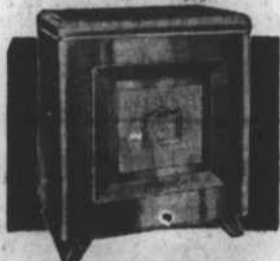
### Mrs. Downum Entertains Bridge Club Thursday

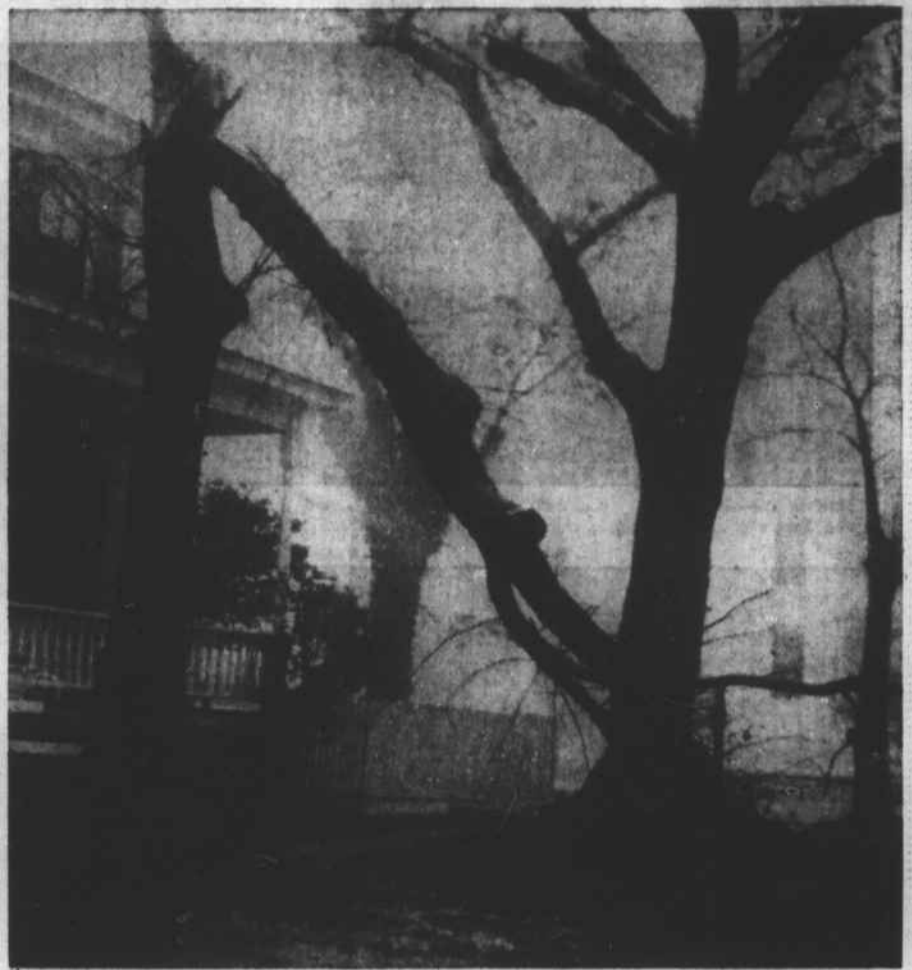

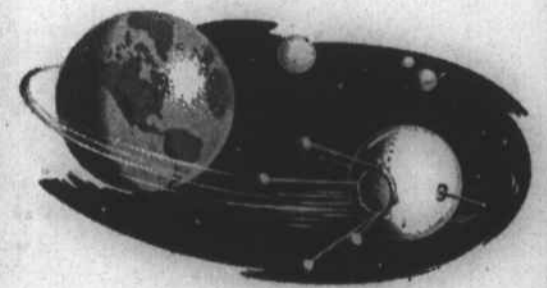
