H. E. Ricks, 71 Dies at Kinston

H. E. Ricks, 71, Kinston, and known to many in this county, died Saturday at a Kinston hospital after an illness of several days. He was affiliated with the Maccabees and made frequent visits to Carteret in connection with the Maccabees insurance program.

Active in community and church affairs, Mr. Ricks is survived by his wife, three daughters and eight grandchildren.

The Kinston Daily Free Press commented editorially on his death:

"The death of Henry Edward Ricks Saturday night after a brief illness takes from Kinston and this section a man who has devoted his life to worthwhile things.

"About 15 years ago Mr. Ricks, who has long been on the official board of the Gordon Street Christian Church and an elder at the time of his death, organized the Kinston Federation of Church School Men. He served continuously as secretary-treasurer of the organization with the exception of one year he was elevated to the presidency.

"He was active in the church and a member of the choir for many years.

"He was the retired state manager of the Maccabees.

"This community has lost a good citizen. His family, a devoted, loyal husband and father. Henry Edward Ricks was indeed a Christian gentleman.
