Health Office Gives TB Report

The county health department, in conjunction with the start of the TB Christmas seal sale, has announced statistics on TB in the county.

Nineteen new cases of tuberculosis have come to light this year. Fifteen patients are in sanatoriums. Five have been discharged since January 1958.

Fifty-six patients in whom the disease is arrested are at home; three others are suspected of having TB; one TB patient died during the past year; one cancer patient was discovered through an x-ray given in the TB program, and a total of 481 x-rays have been made since Jan. 1.

Proceeds from last year's TB seal sale were used to buy x-ray film and developing fluids for the health department, medicines for TB patients, a \$200 illuminator for the reading of x-rays, and to finance x-rays taken of patients who could not afford to pay for them.
