The Rev. John M. Cline, pastor, heard the vows before a background of magnolia leaves and poinsettias. Mrs. Charles Hassell, organist, and Mrs. Jarvis Herring, soloist, presented a program of nuptial music prior to the ceremony. Mrs. Herring sang Song of Ruth and The Lord's Prayer.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore a floor length gown of chantilly lace and tulle fashioned with a fitted bodice, with scalloped sabrina neckline studded with iridescent sequins and long fitted sleeves.

The bouffant skirt, featuring panels of chantilly lace, extended into a chapel length train.
